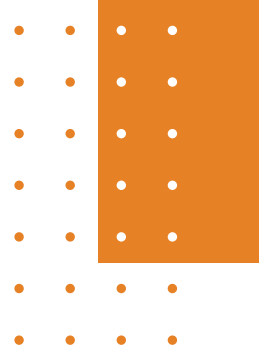

Restoring Health & Dignity

Physical health is often the first step toward total restoration. Throughout 2025, our medical team continued to provide excellent care to children in the facilities. By maintaining a consistent presence, we ensured that preventable illnesses and chronic conditions did not go untreated.



2025 Impact by the Numbers:

- 5,000+ intervention services provided across all facilities.



Biblical Counseling

Healing from the Inside Out



True freedom involves more than just leaving a facility; it requires emotional and spiritual healing. Our counseling program spent the year helping students understand God's care for them and providing opportunities to address their conditions. Through both one-on-one mentorship and group sessions, we created safe spaces for students to process their experiences. Additionally, we prioritized health education, with a significant number of students completing our specialized HIV/AIDS awareness course.

171

students completed the HIV/AIDS health awareness course.

55

The Journey Home

The heart of our mission is seeing families restored. In 2025, our social workers traveled extensively—up to 300 miles in some instances—to find families and understand the complexities required to return children to their homes. Our work didn't stop at the front door; the team worked to ensure children were integrated into their community and a local church, and at times facilitated access to apprenticeships.

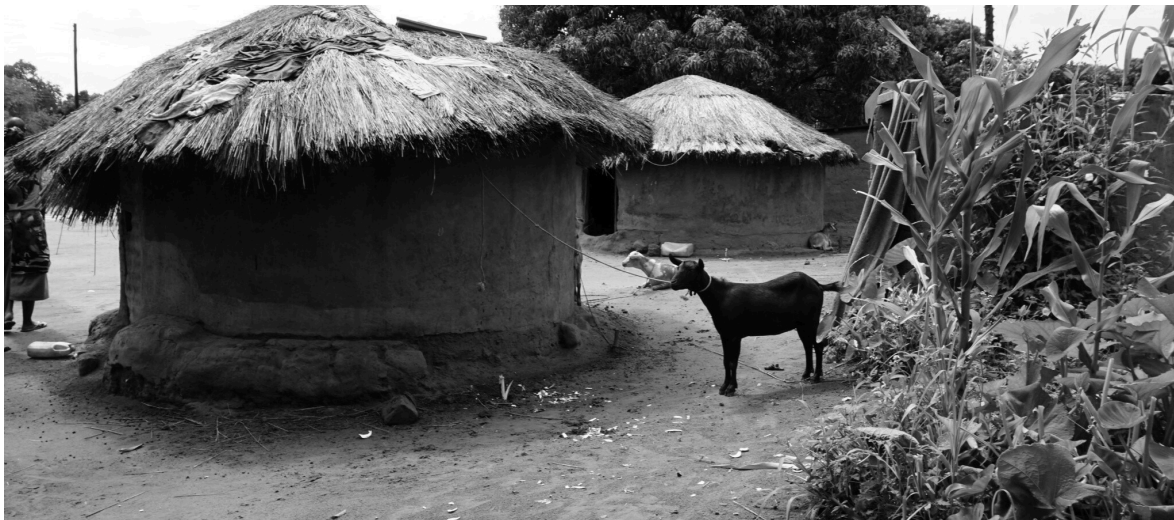
2025 Impact by the Numbers:

Legal Advocacy

Fighting for Justice

For many children, the legal system is a maze they cannot navigate alone. Throughout 2025, we continued to work to ensure children were able to access the courts and the legal system. We focused on ensuring they reached the courts on their assigned dates and that parents and caretakers were present whenever possible. While we are proud of the access provided this year, we are excited for the partnerships we are working on for 2026 to help clear the backlog of cases and ensure even more justice is served.

2025 Impact :

- Ensured consistent access to courts for assigned hearing dates.
- Facilitated parental presence at court hearings.



Critical Needs

Meeting Immediate Needs



It is impossible to focus on the future when you are hungry or cold. This year, we addressed the most urgent physical needs of the children we serve, providing essentials like food, clean water, mattresses, and mosquito nets. Beyond immediate relief, we provided items needed for long-term rehabilitation and reintegration. This included equipping facilities with tools for growth, such as sewing machines, a fully furnished hairdressing studio, and sports equipment.

In 2025, we focused on deepening our roots in Uganda by adding several new in-country partnerships. One specific success story is our partnership with the iCARRe Foundation. iCARRe goes beyond simple recreation; they use basketball to teach discipline and self-worth. Through training camps, friendly matches, and leadership development, they are mentoring the next generation of leaders on and off the court.
